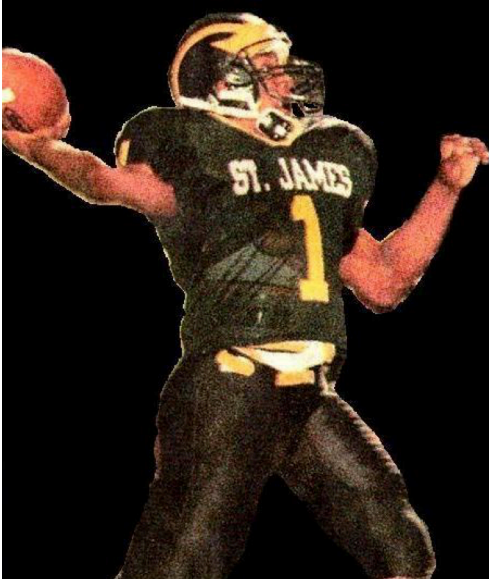

Corey Webster, 6' 1" 185



The class 3A All-State quarterback and District Offensive MVP was a member of the Times Picayune Top 24 Blue Chip List, The Advocate Dirty Dozen, and Tiger Rag Dirty Dozen. Webster was an exceptional two-sport athlete in football and basketball, averaging more than 20 points per game. He passed for 1,277 yards and rushed for an additional 500 yards and 18 touchdowns as a senior leading his team to a 32-8 record in three years as the starter. The Wildcats reached the State Finals in 96', Semi-Finals in 97' & 98' and the Quarterfinals in his senior season 99'.

One of the nation's top cover cornerbacks as both a junior and senior, Corey Webster became LSU's first two-time First-Team All-American since Wendell Davis in 1986-87. Webster capped his career in 2004 by earning First-Team All-America honors from the American Football Coaches

Association as well as The Sporting News. As a senior, Webster recorded 33 tackles and two interceptions for the nation's No. 3 rated defense. For his career, Webster picked off 16 passes, which ranks second in LSU history to only Mike Williams, who had 20 interceptions during his career with the Tigers. Originally signed as a wide receiver, Webster played his first season with the Tigers on offense before making the switch to the secondary prior to his sophomore season. In 2003, Webster's Tigers won its first National Championship since 1958 defeating the Oklahoma Sooners 21-14 in the Louisiana Superdome. Webster, a second round pick (43<sup>rd</sup> overall) of the New York Giants in the 2005 NFL Draft, tied an LSU single-game record with three interceptions against Florida in 2002. For his career, Webster had 115 tackles and 5.5 tackles for losses. He ranks first in LSU history with 49 passes defensed.



Webster started nine seasons in the NFL for the New York Giants tallying 371 tackles, 7 forced fumbles, and 20 interceptions for 226 yards including 1 touchdown. He added 34 tackles, 1 forced fumble and 2 interceptions in the playoffs. Webster played with an edge; his knack for the big play allowed him to be aggressive resulting in 98 pass deflections, the most in team history. He never backed down from a challenge, his ability to lock up a team's number one receiver whether it was Brandon Marshall, Steve Smith, or Terrell Owens was unmatched. In 2007, he set up the game winning field goal in overtime of the NFC Championship Game as he intercepted the last career pass thrown by legendary QB Brett

Farve as a Green Bay Packer. Webster helped the Giants win two Super Bowls XLII and XLVI over the New England Patriots. Webster deflected two consecutive passes from a desperate Tom Brady to Randy Moss preventing the Patriots from scoring, and securing the Super Bowl XLII victory.
